We all have software installed on our computers. Most popular software is periodically updated to add features, fix bugs, improve security, improve usability, or provide additional functionality. While some software offers the capability to notify the user that updates are available, and some software can be configured to automatically update itself, the vast majority of software provides the user with no information when either major new versions are available, or minor build improvements are to be had. To regularly maintain our software libraries may require us to spend a lot of time researching new updates and versions, or we can use one of several utilities, generically referred to as "Software Update Monitors (SUMs)" that can quickly determine the versions of software that are installed on our computers, and then search the internet to determine if any newer versions or builds are available. Some of these "SUMs" simply provide the user with a listing of the outdated software installed on his computer and possibly web links to download the updated software, while other "SUMs" actually reach out and automatically download and install the updated software.

One factor that users might want to consider before updating software that they are satisfied with is that the appearance or usability of the newer software may be different from the older versions that they are familiar with. It is also possible that an older stable version may be replaced by a less stable newer version, leading to software crashes or freezes. While there are many examples of software updates that led to unhappy users, the overwhelming majority of software updates are generally beneficial, especially if security is enhanced.

There are several of these Software Updates Managers available, mostly for free, that when run, will automatically determine which software needs to be updated, and then automatically download and install the updates. A listing and review of several of them is available at Gizmo's TechSupportAlert (www.techsupportalert.com/best-free-software-update-monitor.htm). One of my favorites, and the favorite of millions of users, is Ninite (ninite.com). According to the Ninite website, "We install and update over 500,000 programs each day for millions of home users." Using Ninite is very simple, and very reliable. Ninite can also be used to automatically install new software on a computer. To use Ninite, go to ninite.com and follow the very simple on-screen directions: " 1. Click all the apps you want. You can learn more about a program by hovering over it. 2. Click "Get Installer" and run it. Ninite installs apps for you in the background. No clicking next. We say NO to toolbars or other junk. 3. Run it again later. Your installer will update apps to the latest versions. If something is up-to-date we'll skip it." Ninite will quickly create a small installer program that contains the selected software list, which the user downloads; the Ninite installer that I use is only 248kb in size, and downloaded almost instantly. The installer is run by the user and very quickly searches the computer for any of the selected programs, determining the installed versions. If a new program is selected from the Ninite list, Ninite is intelligent enough to recognize that it is a clean install, and will install the selected programs. If the latest versions of selected programs are already installed, Ninite will recognize that fact, and not download or reinstall the program, leaving the current program intact. Ninite will access the internet, go directly to the software publishers' website or officially authorized download location, sequentially download each update or new program, and install it without user intervention. One especially nice feature of Ninite is that the installation and updating of software does not require any user intervention; there is no "Next" button to click, no frequent rebooting, and Ninite automatically rejects any unnecessary add-ons such as toolbars, home page changes, and junk files. While automatically downloading multiple programs and updates does not require any user intervention, it may take some time to physically download and install the several files, with progress displayed in real-time.

The basic Ninite installer is free for personal use, and is reusable without needing to download a fresh copy unless additional software is added to the list. Rerunning the small installer periodically is a good practice, as it will again check the selected software for updates, automatically downloading and installing the updates. If the user changes his software library, either adding or deleting titles, returning to the Ninite.com website and re-selecting software is a fast and easy process, with a fresh copy of the installer almost instantly created and downloaded. For individuals who want totally automated software updating,

without having to manually run a SUMs like the free version of Ninite, Ninite offers Ninite Updater, a \$9.99 (annual subscription) utility that automatically and frequently checks for new software versions in the background, without user intervention, and, if any updates are found, places a red "N" (for Ninite) notification in the system tray; one click, and updates are downloaded and installed. If no updates are currently available, a bright green "N" appears in the system tray. For large corporate, organizational, or academic users, Ninite offers Ninite Pro which can automatically maintain and update the software on all of the networked computers. Ninite Pro pricing is based on the number of computers in use, and can be as low as \$20 per month for up to 100 connected computers, incrementally increasing to \$185 per month for up to 1000 connected computers, Ninite offers custom pricing.

Another free standing "SUMs" update checker that I periodically use is Patch My PC, available as a free download from patchmypc.net/download. PatchMyPC.exe is a small, 477kb program that requires no installation, is ready to run when downloaded, and can also be run from a flash drive as a portable update checker. Patch My PC has been reviewed by many of the computer publications and websites, and has earned numerous awards, including a five star (highest) editors' rating from CNET, "Editors' Pick" from Majorgeeks, and a five star "Essential" rating from FindMySoft Review. Patch My PC is very easy to use; run it, and it will very quickly search the user's computer for eligible software. According to the Patch My PC website, "When Patch My PC is started, it will scan for outdated software automatically. If outdated software is detected, it will be shown as Red, up to date software will show as Green, and if it's not installed it will show as Black." Patch My PC can be as simple as running it, allowing it to identify the most common software installed on the computer, and selecting to update all of the out-of-date software found. For those users who want grater power and control, Patch My PC offers a lot of flexibility and options. Selecting "Other Software" from either the menu in the left margin or a tab on the top-left of the window, displays a lengthy list of other, less common software than can be monitored and updated by Patch My PC. One of the menu items on the left margin invokes Microsoft's Windows Update service, and checks for any uninstalled Windows updates. Tabs over the right window offer additional service to the user, including a startup manager, an uninstaller, a scheduler to automatically check for software updates at selected times, and an options tab that allows the user to better control the functionality of the program. I have found Patch My PC to be both powerful and useful, and is one of the utilities that I carry on a keychain flash drive, to be used whenever I need to check another computer for software updates.

By choice, I prefer to have the newest and latest versions of the software that I frequently use, and both Ninite and Patch My PC are excellent ways to maintain a software library. Each has software titles lacking on the other, so I periodically switch between them, running one, and then running the other a few weeks later. These two Software Updates Managers, as well as most of the others, have made it very easy to keep our software updated; this is one of the several necessities often required to enhance our computer security. I like the euphoria of snuggling into bed with a new puzzle on my clipboard. In the morning I check out the Wordplay forum, http://wordplay.blogs.nytimes.com, for discussion of the puzzle.

If you're new to NYT crosswords, understand that the Mon-Tue ones are relatively easy. Wed-Thu are medium, and Fri-Sat are very challenging. Sun is like Thu but bigger.

IMHO, NYT puzzles are the highest quality of the genre. Check out these solving tips from Xword Editor Will Shortz, at < http://nyti.ms/11AYe6K > For free, you can try out some older puzzles under Classic Puzzles.

Try making XWords part of your summer recreation. Like learning to ride a bike, you'll be wobbly and mystified at first, but once you get the hang of it the ride is smooth and pleasant.

Open Garden

Open Garden has nothing to do with horticulture. It's a technology that interconnects devices such as smartphones, laptops and tablets to form a wireless peer-to-peer mesh network for access to the Internet. For example, by installing Open Garden on your cell phone and laptop (PC and Mac), your laptop has access to the Internet via your phone when Wi-Fi hot spots are not available. If others have Open Garden installed on their devices you would all share connectivity and bandwidth. It is the digital equivalent of grazing on the commons. Open Garden provides an "automatic path choice." When the software detects multiple Internet connections, it will select the fastest one available and will switch to another connection if the original slows or goes off line. The advantage is that it can offload traffic from an overburdened access route to one less utilized, say from a 3G or 4G connection to an enabled Wi-Fi 33 connection.

Currently Open Garden is available for Android, Windows, and Macintosh operating systems. An iOS version (for the iPhone) is planned for the future. In principal widespread deployment of this technology could reduce capital expenditures for wireless carriers such as Verizon, AT&T, Sprint, etc. by transferring traffic from their cellular circuits to Wi-Fi___33. However, the carriers might revolt if they perceive they will lose revenue that is not made up by lower capital investments. It is a complex business situation and no one knows at this time how the cell phone companies will react or if consumers will adopt Open Garden. Improving PC Performance by Adding Memory

Increasing the amount of memory in your PC is the simplest and least expensive way to improve performance. The procedure is quite simple even for those who are hardware challenged. These instructions pertain to desktop PCs, although adding or changing memory in laptops is similar (see http://www.wikihow.com/Upgrade-YourLaptop%27s-RAM-Memory).

- 1. Determine how much memory is currently in your computer (instructions for Windows 7) by: left-click on Start, right-click on Computer, then left-click on Properties. Under System will be a line "Installed memory (RAM)".
- 2. Determine how many memory slots are available in your computer. This can be done by consulting your PC owner's manual, opening up your computer for inspection (more on this later), or using one of the tools such as that available from Crucial.com (see below).
- 3. Determine how much memory you need. This is rather subjective. Many will advise "you can't have too much memory", but 4-8 GB is probably adequate for most people. 12-16 GB or more may be advisable for those doing video or photo editing. For those playing computer games or doing heavy duty processing, the more the better.
- 4. Determine the correct memory needed for your computer. Again, this information should be available in your PC owner's manual. For example, for the HP Pavilion HPE h8xt the memory specified is SO-DIMM, 204-pin DDR3DIMM, PC3-10600 (1333 MHz) DDR3-SDRAM, Unbuffered, non-EC (64-bit) DIMMs, 1.5 V memory only. It is crucial that you buy the correct memory; there are many kinds of memory (DDR, DDR2, DDR3, RDRAM, SDRAM, etc.) sold by numerous vendors (Amazon, Newegg, TigerDirect, Micro Center, etc.) including some manufacturers. Companies that sell memory will sometimes provide a tool you can download that will tell you the type of memory your computer uses, the number of memory slots available on your machine, etc. For example see Crucial.com at http://www.crucial.com/store/drammemory.aspx. It is generally advisable to use

exactly the same brand, model with the precise specifications for all memory rather than just add additional memory.

- Installing the memory.
- a. Unplug everything from the computer, although some recommend leaving the power cord plugged in to ground the computer, but be certain the computer is not running.
- b. Be sure to ground yourself to the computer case before working on the machine. Static electricity can seriously damage components of your computer. It is preferable to use an antistatic wrist strap for this purpose (see http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Antistatic wrist strap). These devices are quite inexpensive.
- c. Open up the computer's case. This will be somewhat different for every machine. Sometimes a screw driver will be needed.
- d. Locate the memory module(s) and carefully remove them, assuming they are being replaced. Some memory cards have clips at the ends while others tilt forward or backward to remove. Look carefully and go gently.
- e. Snap the new memory module(s) in place taking care to seat them correctly. Apply pressure evenly across the width of module. Often you will hear a "click" as the module is seated.
 - f. Close up the computer and reattach all the peripherals.
- g. Boot up the computer and check to verify (step #1) that the computer "sees" all the memory you installed.

Up Telescope! The Man with the Bionic Eye

Hopefully you are not one of the more than 17 million people over age 65 who has either lost or are losing their vision due to age-related macular degeneration, or known simply as AMD, the leading cause of blindness in older Americans.

Thanks to the marvels of technology, however, hope – and sight -- are being restored for qualified AMD patients – like 82-year-old Dan Dunbar of Costa Mesa, Calif.

Dunbar is only the second person in the United States to have the CentraSight telescope, a surgical device the size of a pea, implanted into his left eye where his vision was worse than in his right eye.

According to the manufacturer, advanced stage AMD patients have a central blind spot or missing area in their vision that neither glasses, drugs or cataract surgery can fix. Everyday activities like reading, watching TV, seeing faces, brushing teeth, applying makeup or preparing meals are difficult and challenging.

To qualify for the implant, patients must:

- Have irreversible, end-stage AMD resulting from either dry or wet AMD.
- No longer be a candidate for drug treatment.
- Never had cataract surgery in the implant eye.
- Meet the age (over 75), vision and cornea health requirements.

The patients' physicians must assess if the benefits outweigh the risks before deciding if the implant treatment option is a viable one for them. The new medical device and technology do not offer a total cure but will restore vision enough to improve their independence and ability to perform normal activities.

For Dunbar, who loves to ski, dabble in model trains and do woodworking, the surgery is a "miracle", he said. Although it wasn't an overnight difference-maker, he appreciates every moment

of his new world of sight. In case you are wondering, his driving days are over but his wife, Jean, son and two daughters take him everywhere he needs to go.

"In my case, the surgery took only 90 minutes, but my eyes were dilated for almost three months before I could feel the results of the telescope," he said.

Meanwhile, the former "rocket scientist" (he helped develop a liquid rocket system that was used by U.S. defense agencies) continues to undergo special eye exercises designed to improve his peripheral and "straight ahead" vision as well as his depth perception. But with the help of a few ordinary vision aids (illuminated magnifying glasses and goggles) and his new bionic eye, he can see things he could never see before.

Dunbar's vision problems began in 1960 when he became nearsighted in high school, the result of scarring and a bleeding artery in his retina. For 30 years, he suffered from continued vision loss and attacks of blood vessel bleeding. Doctors were unable to diagnose or treat the disorder beyond occasional, often painful cortisone shots.

Through referrals from various local optometrists, including one at Costco, ophthalmologists and his own veterinarian son, Dunbar learned about the CentraSight telescope implant from a Beverly Hills retina specialist, Dr. David Boyer. After determining that he was a perfect candidate for the procedure, eye surgeon Dr. Samuel Masket performed the surgery in November 2011 at Good Samaritan Hospital in Los Angeles.

"When Dr. Boyer explained the technology, the procedure and the healing process to me, it sounded very reasonable and I put my full trust in the medical team," he said.

Following the surgery, Dunbar began several weeks of rehabilitation at The Center for Partially Sighted in Culver City. He continues to perform eye exercises at home and returns to the center less frequently.


"I can see faces clearly at more than 20 feet. Being able to watch a person's face as you to talk to them is a feature that I had forgotten. Now I can not only see their faces and their reactions to my words, I can also see their eyes and where they are looking," he said.

However, Dunbar is most proud of his ability to return to his normal "blue" level ski slopes. "I found that my telescope gives me excellent distance assessment of the snow on the runs...and it allows me to see other skiers, recognize each daughter and grandsons at 100 feet and to see the snow conditions in front of me," he added.

"Not a day goes by that I don't see something I haven't seen in five years. I feel part of the world again."

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
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
